Finding Inspiration

Where does inspiration come from? Where do you get your ideas for a cool background, pose or location? What is the trigger that unleashes your creativity?

About thirteen years ago, I was to speak to a group of photographers in Central Texas. I always try to visit other studios when I'm on the road to get ideas for backgrounds, wall colors, or camera room tricks. This trip was no different. At the time, I didn't know John Pack but I saw the sign advertising his studio as I drove through Waco. I stopped in to introduce myself and to look around. John's assistant was there and let me know he would be there shortly, and to make myself at home. I saw beautiful portraits of all genres with the ever-present stacks of frames and equipment here and there.

After awhile, John arrived and was gracious enough to show me around. One of the first things that drew my attention in the camera room was a bunch of aluminum cans stuck to a wall. Tops were adhered to the wall with the bottoms facing the camera position and they were very tightly grouped. No mention of the cans was made at the time because John was busy showing me all aspects of his operation... props, backgrounds, etc. We walked through the camera room several times but my attention kept going back to that aluminum can wall. I couldn't stop thinking about it.

Soon the tour was over and I was about to leave. But curiosity got the best of me and I asked, "John, what's with the cans glued to the wall?" He replied that it was his most popular and most requested background. I stood there in

stoned silence. Seeing the blank look on my face, he proceeded to present to me several outstanding portraits with the soda can background. The bottoms of the cans provided a series of circles that were very abstract due to the wider aperture he had used to create the portraits. The silver aluminum circles seemed to go with every senior outfit he photographed with that set. I was completely amazed.

I left John's studio that day with the best idea for a background ever! When I got home, I started gathering cans. It took awhile. I used a product called Liquid Nails to adhere the cans to a 4x8 piece of heavy plywood but I took the idea to a new level by painting the bottom of the cans flat black. Used with Gels, I could make the cans appear any color I wanted, even using school colors on the cans. I still have that background.

The moral of the story is "Never shrug off a good idea." When attending a convention or seminar, listen to the guy or girl next to you. You might learn just as much from them as you do from the speaker. They might just give you the best idea ever.

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

He was 14 years old when he picked up his first camera, a Kodak Retina, and learned darkroom techniques as a teenager working in a camera store in Charleston, South Carolina. Some of his first subjects were people on the streets and rusty machinery that he felt captured society in decay. But as J. Henry Fair's eco-consciousness rose in the 1990's, his attention once again turned back to that rusty machinery, industry and pollution.

J. Henry Fair is a commercial photographer who has photographed everything from expensive jewelry to some of the world's greatest opera singers. However, he is well-known in artistic and environmental circles for his unique photographs of "industrial scars" that more closely resemble abstract paintings by Georgia O'Keeffe than the disturbing scenes of reality that they actually depict. His work has been featured on the TODAY Show, CNN, FOX News, and in many major publications, including National Geographic, Harper's Magazine, TIME and others, and his work is displayed in galleries and fine-art museums around the world.

"My work is a response to my vision of society," says Fair. "I see our culture as being addicted to petroleum and the unsustainable consumption of other natural resources, which seems to portend a future of scarcity." But his goal is not to indict or to identify polluters by name, but to raise public awareness as to the costs of our choices.

When he began his mission, Fair was somewhat frustrated that he could not see and photograph whatever was hiding behind the walls and fences of industrial plants. Then, on a cross-country flight several years ago, he looked out the

window of the plane and noticed a series of cooling towers poking through a low-flying fog and recalls thinking, "Just get a plane!"

Since that time, he has traveled from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico and other locations around the world, photographing from the open window of a small plane, getting just close enough to document the frightening realizations of the true costs of our heavily industrialized society. His images are both stunning and horrifying.

The photograph of the "tar sands upgrader" should be of particular interest to Texans considering the controversy over the Keystone Pipeline. Fair explains that the tar sands upgrading process produces much sulphur waste, and though it has many industrial uses (fertilizer, gun powder, matches, insecticides,





fungicides), the market is over-supplied. After it is removed during the "upgrading" process, it is pumped in a liquid state onto large waste stacks. The USA gets about 10% of its gasoline from the tar sands in Alberta, one of the largest petroleum reserves in the world, as well as being one of the largest environmental disasters. He has flown over paper mills in Ontario, West Virginia mountaintops ravaged by mining, oil refineries in Texas, oil spills in the Gulf of Mexico, coal ash disposal sites, and a string of factories along the Lower Mississippi River known as "Cancer Alley," as well as other locations around the world.



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J. Henry Fair's book, "The Day After Tomorrow: Images of Our Earth in Crisis," is published by PowerHouse Books in cooperation with Random House. The book contains 80 color images from his Industrial Scars project with accompanying scientific data. Fair is also co-founder of the Wolf Conservation Center in South Salem, N.Y., an organization dedicated to the protection of and education about the world's wolf population. 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Virtual Backgrounds Unveils New Digital Projector System

One of the most innovative photographic tools on the market today was developed right here in Texas. Virtual Backgrounds, based in San Marcos, Texas, was founded in the 1980's by Dr. Henry Oles, a professional photographer who perfected a system to project backgrounds in a studio environment that would give professional photographers a decisive edge when it came to providing a variety of backgrounds.

Since it's inception, the Virtual Backgrounds system was based on projecting slides of backgrounds onto a special ultra reflective screen positioned behind the subject instead of using canvas backgrounds, polystyrene sets, or going on location. The special projector is attached to the camera and projects the background image onto the background through a beam-splitter. Those who use the system say it provides flexibility and variety and sets them apart from their competition.

The slide technology has worked fine for many years but Virtual Backgrounds was often criticized for using "old technology" in a digital world. Today, all of that has changed with the recent introduction of a new HD quality projection system that can be integrated into any of the existing Virtual Background machines or purchased with a new machine. "We didn't want to leave our past customers behind, so we designed the system so it could be added to many of the slide-based projectors, enabling our customers to work with both slide projection and digital projection," says Dr. Oles.

With the new system that has recently been announced, backgrounds are now digital files that can be created with a DSLR, I-pad, or even a cell phone camera. The files can be manipulated in size, position, color, and focus. Text can even be added to the background. A subject can be photographed and then that image can be almost instantly projected as a background for that subject or a school mascot can instantly become a background. "A digital based background projector enables the photographer to essentially immediately project a captured background that may be customized for a particular subject at zero cost," says Oles.

The Virtual Backgrounds system was primarily designed for professional photographers to provide them with a tool that enables them to provide backgrounds that others cannot create, providing customers with a unique experience and giving them a specialized product. Many of the components of the system, excluding the actual digital video projector, are manufactured in Texas and are assembled and shipped from the San Marcos facility.

Fundamental to the success of Virtual Backgrounds has been their educational programs. In addition to the workshops held at the San Marcos facility, Dr. Oles has written a number of books including

"Background Power!" and "The Professional Photographers Perfect Storm," which predicted the digital revolution long before it took place and suggested ways for the professional photographer to prosper during and after the digital revolution. Another one of his publications, "How to Make Money with Virtual Backgrounds," outlines creative ways for the users to set themselves apart from their competition.

Dr. Henry Oles and his wife Marian are professional photographers who have photographed over 1,000 weddings during their photographic careers and are dedicated to the survival and the success of the profession. Before becoming involved in professional photography and Virtual Backgrounds, Marian worked as a surgical nurse with an RN degree. Henry holds a PhD in psychology from the University of Pittsburgh and taught psychology for 20 years at two different universities. This part of his life caused him to place extraordinary emphasis on customer education and on the principles of marketing.

The recent announcement of the new digital projection system for Virtual Background is the latest advancement in a system that has proven itself to be one of the most innovative tools for professional photographers in an ever-increasingly competitive market. 
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BASIC DAYLIGHT EXPOSURE

Basic daylight exposure, also called the “Sunny 16 Rule,” is a simple approach that allows photographers to produce a correctly exposed image during daylight hours (when the sun is more than 20 degrees above the horizon), anywhere in the world and without using a meter or taking test shots.

The formula is simple. Any front-lit subject or object should be photographed at 1/ISO at f/16. For example, at ISO 125, your exposure would be 1/125 second at f/16. With an ISO of 125, you could also use: 1/4000 at f/2.8, 1/2000 at f/4, 1/1000 at f/5.6, 1/500 at f/8, 1/250 at f/11, 1/125 at f/16, 1/60 at f/22, 1/30 at f/3.5, or 1/15 at f/45.

Palo Duro Canyon & Quanah Parker

It is the second largest canyon in the United States and has been named "The Grand Canyon of Texas" both for its size and its dramatic geological features. It is 120 miles long, as much as 20 miles wide, and reaches a maximum depth of 800 feet. Georgia O'Keeffe described Palo Duro as "a burning, seething cauldron, filled with dramatic light and color."

As far as grand canyons go, Palo Duro is a geological baby, born near the end of the last glacial retreat some 20,000 years ago. It is still inventing and molding itself from water erosion from the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River which initially winds along the Llano Estacado of West Texas and dramatically runs off the Caprock Escarpment. The steep mesa walls and multi-colored layers of rock in Palo Duro closely resemble that of the Grand Canyon and many of the formations include caves and hoodoos throughout the 29,182 acre Palo Duro Canyon State Park, located on the northern most portion of the canyon.



The first European explorers to visit Palo Duro were members of the Coronado expedition back in 1541 but evidence of human habitation of the canyon goes back some 10,000 to 15,000 years. Apache Indians lived in the canyon at one time but were later displaced by the Comanche and Kiowa tribes who had the advantage of owning horses brought over by the Spanish.

With plenty of game, edible plants, fresh water from the Prairie Dog Town Fork, and the protection from the weather that the canyon provided to the Comanche and Kiowas, life was good. But the Plains Indians' way of life was under constant attack by expansionist politicians, desperate farmers and ranchers, powerful railroads, and persuasive missionaries. In response to them, the Plains Indians had raided settlements and sometimes took captives who could be sold into slavery or adopted into the tribe. Soon, Anglo Texans demanded that this "menace" be eradicated.

It was during this era that Quanah Parker emerged as a dominant figure in the history of Palo Duro and of the entire Indian Nation. He was the son of Comanche Chief Peta Nocona and Cynthia Ann Parker, an English-American who, in 1836, had been kidnapped at the age of nine and assimilated into the tribe.

In 1874, a Comanche medicine man named Isa-tai called for a Sun Dance and, at that gathering, he and Quanah Parker recruited warriors for raids into the Texas Panhandle to avenge slain relatives. Although the party was repelled by long-range Sharps rifles, Quanah Parker's horse was shot out from under him at a range of over 500 yards and he was hit by a ricocheting bullet that lodged in his shoulder. The incident would lead to the Red River War which culminated in a decisive Army victory in the Battle of Palo Duro Canyon that same year.

As with many military campaigns against the Indians in those days, this expedition was quite one-sided. Surrounded on all sides by MacKenzie's troops, the Indians knew they were outnumbered and out gunned. Although a shoot-out ensued, casualties were light and Quanah Parker and the Indians surrendered. But surrender was not enough for the U.S. Cavalry and, in a move designed to demoralize and to deny the Indians of their main weapon and source of livelihood, MacKenzie and his troops rounded up over 1,000 horses and slaughtered them in a hail of bullets. It was a tactic used by George Custer a few years earlier and signaled the end of a way of life for the Plains Indians.

After the Indians were relocated to reservations in Oklahoma, the U.S. Government appointed Quanah Parker as principal chief of the entire nation and he earned the respect of government leaders as he adapted to the white man's way of life and eventually became a prosperous rancher in Oklahoma. It is reported that Parker helped celebrate President Theodore Roosevelt's inauguration by appearing in a parade and, in April of 1905, Roosevelt visited Parker at his home in Oklahoma.



Although he adopted many of the European-American ways, Quanah Parker always wore his hair long and in braids and refused to follow U.S. marriage laws by taking up to eight wives at one time. He died in February of 1911 at his home in Oklahoma.

Palo Duro Canyon and Quanah Parker are an integral part of the rich history of the State of Texas. Located just south of Amarillo, Palo Duro State Park offers guided tours, stables, wagon rides, campfire breakfasts, souvenirs and a variety of services and events for the whole family. During the summer months, Palo Duro hosts an outdoor musical drama in the Pioneer Amphitheater against an authentic tapestry of rich history, documenting the struggles and triumphs of settlers during the 1800's. Used properly, Auto Flash provides amazingly consistent results. The February meeting included a digital print competition with three competent judges.
