The announcement came in May from the Professional Photographers of America that the Texas magazine took first place in Category I of the PPA Affiliate Communications Competition.

Category I includes printed publications over 12 pages that are printed at least three times a year. The Texas Professional Photographer averages between 36 and 44 pages and is printed six times a year.

The annual competition, sponsored by the Professional Photographers of America, was designed to improve affiliate publications and websites and recognizes those involved in producing these communication tools. It awards every eligible entrant one PPA merit per entry. Those who place or earn an honorable mention receive an additional merit for each winning entry.





Qualified judges came in from the communications field, specializing in different segments, from marketing communication to magazine editing, and scored magazines, newsletters and websites in regards to editorial content, overall appearance and service to members.

Bill Hedrick has been the Editor of the Texas Professional Photographer since 1997, taking over the position after the retirement of TPPA Editor. Walt Hawkins. Since that time, the

Over the last 14 years, Bill has streamlined the Texas Professional Photographer into a well-oiled and efficient publication that is the envy of PPA affiliates nationwide. "It's been fun and exciting to see these changes take place," says Bill, who has published over 89 issues from his home office in Kilgore, Texas.

From each issue, several hundred additional copies of the magazines are mailed to vendors around the state as part of a TPPA membership drive established when Ed Alexander was president of the association. Vendors place them on their counters to give to their customers. The Texas Professional Photographer is

His early post-collegiate years were spent on the camera crews of studio films including Twister, Conspiracy Theory, and Armageddon, learning from top ASC cinematographers and personal mentors including Conrad Hall, Don Burgess, Dean Cundey, and John Schwartzman. Soon after, Alex became a full-time



cinematographer of indie films, music videos, and as the Director of Photography for the Saturday Night Live Film Unit.

In 2009, Alex's 10th season with Saturday Night Live marked his first experimentation with the new HDSLR format, shooting the show's title sequence and most of the season's commercial parodies with Canon's 5Dm2 and 7D cameras, earning him sponsorship with both CanonUSA and Lexar Media.

field of expertise was still-life and special effects, often using multiple 4x5 cameras to shoot multiple exposures on the same sheet of film to create complex shots for advertising. After returning to America in 1992, he began applying those techniques to the world of industrial location photography. The concept of "painting with light," has been around since the invention of cameras with long shutters and basically involves selectively illuminating various parts of a subject in a darkened room or at night. Eric takes this technique to an entirely new level.
